

- ANNA: Oh! What are the ingredients?
- BEN: Banana leaves, fish, beef, pork, chicken and vegetables.
- ANNA: And how is it prepared?

BEN: First, a hole in the ground with fire and red-hot stones is made. Then, the hot stones are covered with banana leaves. After that, beef, pork, chicken and fish are chopped or sliced. Then, they are placed on the leaves. Next, another layer of leaves and stones is used to cover the meat. Then, another layer of vegetables, like sweet potatoes, is added. Finally, another layer of banana leaves and soil is placed on top. Everything is cooked by the fire and the heat from the hot stones.




